However, there was absolutely nothing crisp about the cozy feeling emanating inside the audience-filled auditorium as one of our own YAM alumni, Lilly Svrlinga took the stage to angelically sing The National Anthem.

Following were three of our YAM alumni bands, showcasing our finest! Bluegrass and Company, featuring Alyssa White on the guitar, Malachi Ellenburg on the fiddle, Elijah Ellenburg on the banjo, and James McDowell, guest performer from Hendersonville, NC on the mandolin. This band glistened and shined as they presented each selection in its splendid form!
